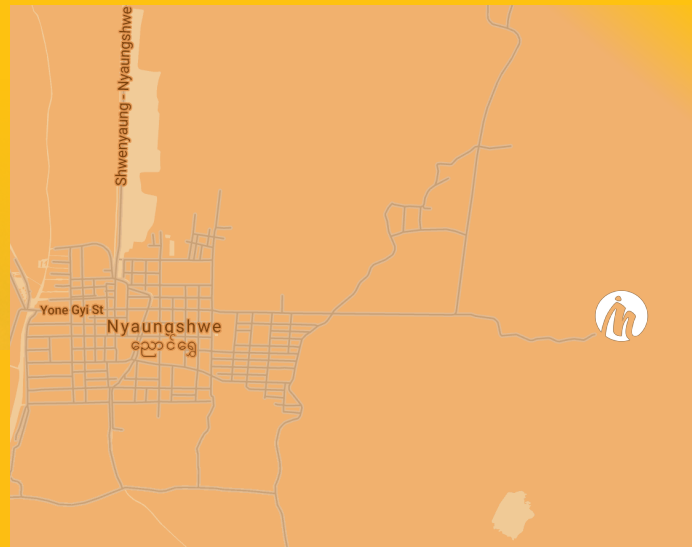


The Mudita Foundation is a german NGO with the aim of improve living conditions for underprivileged and orphaned children in Myanmar.

In January 2018, the project started and in the first year, a self-sufficient complex for more than 200 children was built on 12.5 acres of land within a buddhist monastery. With the help of international volunteers, the involvement of local people and donors, a long-term eco project based on local resources is being developed. It is a pilot project and aims to be a role model in the fields of education, health and ecology.

Education & Health

At the Mudita School a new concept based on modern educational pedagogy is introduced. It started with a Waldorf kindergarten, followed by computer and English classes. Art and music enhance children's creativity. Sports, handicraft and eco farming let them understand nature and develop life skills. Part of the new curriculum is also to teach children about hygiene and nutrition. Also a clinic for the physical well-being of the children was set up. Yoga and mindfulness classes round up our health program, which not only produces healthy kids but also create lots of joy and happiness in their lives.

Ecology

The nature-bound, holistic approach is also applied to our external living conditions. Our eco-buildings are built only using local resources like clay and bamboo and are based on traditional building methods. In our eco-farm the children learn to understand and respect their environment in order to live a sustainable life in harmony with nature.

The Golden Land

Myanmar is one of the poorest countries in the world. After decades of isolation and political conflicts, the country seeks its way into the modern world. Throughout the education system, there is a culture of rote learning that inhibits the development of analytical and creative thinking. Many Burmese children suffer from various diseases and child labor is widespread. More than 50% live below the poverty line. Since the opening of the country and democratic elections in 2011, attempts are being made to solve the problems in the education system. Without private and international help, however, this major undertaking cannot be accomplished. The main goal is to support a healthy and well-educated new generation with a Waldorf school that picks up the children at their different educational levels.
